





Under the Community Aggregate Payment Levy (CAPL) bytaw, Lac Ste Anne County has collected approximately \$4 million dollars from the local aggregate companies that operate within our borders. The long is regulated under the Municipal Governance Acr, set at \$0.40 per time funds and grows entracted. The internt of the levy is to help benefit the community receiving the funds. Lac Ste, Anne has utilized ine funds for improvements to node, non-profit group grants, recreational facilities, the Conway Regional Medical Clinic, and Swede Moren Bail Rave, to name a few, Without this lawy many community projects would not happen.

The equivalent of one truck load per person is consumed every year in Alberta. Roads, houses, buildings and many other parts of our daily lives contain sand and gravel. Here's the typical Life Cycle of a gravel pit.

{1 Where's the Gravel?

First, companies have to find the gravel. Not all gravel is useable, nor is it everywhere.

{2 Ask for Permission

Before you can dig, gravel companies have to prove that their pit won't damage the environment or minimize impacts like dust and noise.

{3 Getting Ready

Scientists set up their equipment to monitor environmental impacts around the pit like noise and dust. Water cleanliness and haul roads are monitored closely.

Large equipment is needed to uncover the gravel and extract it. Dirt is washed off the rocks and crushed into

Once the pit has no more gravel in it, operators are required to reclaim to its previous use, or even parks or wetlands for example.

(6 Using the Gravel

The gravel used to make roads, homes, schools, hospitals, and even household products like toothpaste or windows!







Challenge for the Room: Tell the story.

In addition to celebrating the clinic's increased capacity to provide medical services to the Lac Ste. Anne region, we're using this opportunity to acknowledge our Community Aggregate Payment (CAP) levy contributors, without whom the recent clinic improvements would not have been possible.

These good news stories create awareness, and this awareness builds acceptance for the public to acknowledge the benefit they receive. This may make it easier to get approvals and permits the next time expansion is required and help change the NIMBY cycle.
